This is a summary of marketing Michigan grown peaches and prunes for the 1976 crop. This report is provided by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Marketing Division, cooperating with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Marketing Service, Fruit and Vegetable Division.

Information contained in this summary was obtained from the daily reports issued at the Federal-State Market News Office at Benton Harbor, Michigan. Other sources of information include the Michigan Crop Reporting Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture; Transportation Section, Washington, D.C. and the Benton Harbor Fruit Market manager, Al Braudo.

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<u>PLANTED ACREAGE:</u> The Michigan planted acreage was unchanged at 14,300 acres in 1976, according to the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. A total of 1,460,000 trees were reported of bearing age in 1976, unchanged from 1975.

PRODUCTION: The 1976 Michigan production was sharply reduced by adverse weather conditions. A total of only 40 million pounds were utilized in 1976, compared with 55 million pounds in 1975. Peach deliveries to the Benton Harbor Fruit Market in 1976 also decreased. A total of 153,000 half bushel baskets, 15,000 three quarter bushel crates, and 4,000 bushel baskets were delivered in 1976, compared with 146,000 half bushel baskets, 29,000 three quarter bushel crates and 11,000 bushel baskets in 1975. Nearly all packing house receipts were also sharply reduced because of poor crop quality.

GROWING CONDITIONS: Weather conditions during 1976 were very adverse and peach damage was especially heavy. Fruit quality was severely affected by freezing temperatures at blossom time. Most buds developed split pits and quality of many offerings was variable at harvest time.

HARVEST: Light picking of some cling varieties began in middle July. Harvest of freestone varieties started in late July and early August. Red Havens accounted for almost 35 percent of the total freestone production. Other Haven varieties in moderate supply during August are Kalhaven, Crest Haven, and Glohaven. In early September Redskins are the dominant variety and supplies were available until middle September.

MARKETING: The 1976 supplies of packed and graded fruit were extremely light. The first 1976 market report covering F.O.B. sales was released on August 2nd. Red Haven prices were sharply higher in 1976 and 3/4 bushel crates, U.S. number one, 2 1/8 inch and up sold at \$8.75 to \$9.00, compared with mostly \$8.00 in 1975. August sales fluctuated very little and prices were mostly \$8.75 to \$9.00 for Red Havens, however, market prices declined in late August as Kalhaven, Glohaven and Crest Haven were offered. In September Redskin sales ranged from \$7.00 to \$8.00 early in the month and as supplies decreased prices advanced to \$9.00-\$9.25. Many peach offerings were sold direct from orchards ungraded in various containers to seasonal buyers and U-pick operations. The final market report covering peach prices was issued on September13th.

<u>PACKAGE:</u> Most fruit shipped from packing houses was packed in 3/4 bushel crates. Because of the adverse quality in 1976 the volume of ungraded fruit increased. These offerings were packed into bushel crates, bushel baskets and 1/2 bushel baskets.

TRANSPORTATION: All Michigan peaches were shipped by truck. The carlot conversion factor is 900 3/4 bushel crates and 1350 1/2 bushel baskets per one carlot equivalent.

41 CITIES: The principal wholesale terminal markets selling Michigan peaches during 1976 were Detroit 11, Chicago 34 and Louisville 9.

PLANTED ACREAGE: According to the Statistical Crop Reporting Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, the total Michigan planted acreage was unchanged in 1976 at 7,400 acres. The total number of bearing trees was also unchanged at 700,000 in 1976.

PRODUCTION: Michigan plum-prune production decreased sharply in 1976 reflecting poor growing conditions. Only 12,000 tons were harvested in 1976, compared with 18,000 tons in 1975. The total United States production was 187,600 tons in 1976, compared with 196,600 tons in 1975. Michigan and Idaho accounted for the largest decrease of 6,000 and 3,000 tons respectively. Oregon and Washington production however, increased slightly with 1,000 and 2,000 tons. The Benton Harbor Fruit Market deliveries also declined sharply in 1976 to a 10 year record low volume. In 1976 only 17,871 half bushel baskets were recorded, compared with 61,222 half bushel baskets in 1975. The movement directly from packing houses was not reported. however a substantial amount was shipped in 1976. The Stanley prune variety represented about 85 percent of Michigan's tree population. Southwestern Michigan accounted for about 45 percent, West Central growing areas 32 percent and the remaining 23 percent was located in the Northwestern growing area.

GROWING CONDITIONS: Unseasonably warm weather in late March prematurely forced bud development three weeks ahead of schedule. The freezing temperatures of late April caused heavy damage especially in Southwestern Michigan. Buds that escaped the frost conditions produced larger than normal fruit at harvest time. Some fruit that escaped the spring freezes was subject to high winds and very dry periods in late August which caused some tree stress.

HARVEST: Lightly scattered picking began in middle August and were about one week earlier than last year because
of the lighter offerings. Stanley prune supplies were very
light through out the 1976 marketing season and peak volume never occured. Light supplies were available until
September 17th.

MARKETING: The first market news report covering F.O.B. prices was issued on September 1st. The 1976 marketing season was very short and because of the extremely light supplies opening prices were sharply higher. The higher market prices attracted some growers with processed volume to pack for fresh market. August prices for half bushel cartons precooled sold at mostly \$5.00-\$5.25 in 1976, compared with \$4.00-\$4.25 in 1975. Shortly after Labor Day on September 10th, inadequate supplies and disinterested buyers depressed market conditions and prices declined to \$3.75-\$4.00. The final market news report was issued for prines on September 17th.

<u>PACKAGE:</u> The 1976 volume was split between 1/2 bushel and 30 pound cartons. The packing house trends seems to be toward the 30 pound carton while the Benton Harbor Fruit Market is practically all 1/2 bushel cartons.

<u>IRANSPORTATION:</u> Practically all plums and prunes were shipped by truck. The conversion factor is 1250 half bushel or 30 pound cartons per carlot equivalent.

41 CITIES: The principal wholesale terminal markets handling Michigan Stanley prunes were Chicago 16, Cleveland 10, Detroit 9, and Pittsburgh 7 carlot equivalents.
