MARKETING WESTERN AND CENTRAL NEW YORK CABBAGE - 1953-54 SEASON

Daily Market Reports were issued on cabbage from the Rochester office of the Federal-State Market News Service, 300 Terminal Building, Rochester 14, New York, from August 24, 1953 through April 9, 1954.

NEW YORK STATE

The acreage planted to the Early Fall crop in New York State this season was slightly higher than a year ago, 14,500 acres as compared with 11,900 during 1952, while the three-year (1949-51) average for the State was 14,350 acres. This acreage was divided as follows for the 1953 season: Domestic - 2,300 acres, Danish - 12,200 acres. Yields were about the same as during the past four years, 11.8 tons per acre during 1953, 11.2 tons during 1952 and 11.6 for the three-year average. Production this season was estimated at 171,100 tons compared with 133,600 tons in 1952 and 167,800 tons for the three-year period. This season's production was divided as follows: 27,100 tons Domestic and 144,000 tons Danish.

New York State continues to lead in the production of cabbage for kraut, this season producing nearly twice as much as Wisconsin. The commercial acreage planted for sauerkraut in New York State this season was 5,500 acres compared with 7,000 in 1952 while the ten-year (1942-51) average for the State was 6,520. Yields were considerably heavier this year, 16.5 tons per acre compared with 12.9 tons during 1952 and 11.5 tons for the ten-year (1942-51) average. The production was estimated at 90,800 tons this season compared with 90,300 tons during 1952 and the ten-year average (1942-51) of 75,200 tons.

Transplanting began earlier this season and by August 1 the crop was ahead of normal development. Hot, dry weather during August and early September delayed the crop materially in many sections. Ample moisture fell late in September and October and the crop improved considerably. In many sections growers delayed harvesting in order to increase their tonnage. There were some light frosts in a few sections during late September but no damage was reported and farmers continued harvesting until late November. Some worm and aphid damage was reported in a few sections but the damage was light. Growers delayed storing because of the warm weather and most stock was stored during late November. A much lighter tonnage of the Danish crop was used for kraut this season than during 1952 due to the heavier tonnage of the Domestic type available.

F. o. b. prices this season were considerably lower than during 1952. 50 lb. sacks of Danish and Domestic, small to medium, ranged from \$.45-1.35 this season as compared with \$.80-1.85 last year. From August 28 through October 16 prices ranged from \$.75-1.35 and after that date until the end of the season prices ranged from \$.45-.85. Prices paid growers were correspondingly lower this season than last, \$8.00-35.00 per ton as compared with \$18.00-50.00 last year.

The movement by truck continues to increase and this season it was estimated that from 60 to 75% of the crop moved in this manner. The movement by rail through April 5 this season was only 323 cars as compared with 618 last season to the same date.

PROCESSING

The demand from processors was quite active from mid-September until mid-November at which time most of the larger plants discontinued purchasing from growers. The contract price this season ranged from \$12.00-15.00 per ton. Purchases on the open market ranged from \$10.00-12.00 per ton until the first of the year and a few small plants operated during January and February paying \$5.00-6.00 per ton.

NEW YORK CABBAGE STOCKS - JANUARY 1, 1954

According to the Crop Reporting Board, stocks of Danish type cabbage in upstate New York on January 1 amounted to 60,500 tons. This compares with 30,000 tons on the same date last year and 10-year average holdings of 26,900 tons. Much of this year's stocks is in temporary storages and, with relatively mild weather before January 1, shrinkage and waste is expected to be heavy.

These estimates cover holdings by growers and dealers in or near areas of production. Most of the stocks are located in Western New York in an area embracing Niagara, Orleans, Monroe and Wayne Counties. Both the production and stocks estimates relate to the total Danish crop in upstate New York, including quantities for both fresh market and kraut. An unusually large proportion of last year's January 1 stocks was used for kraut.

The estimated January 1 stocks this year amount to 41 percent of the harvested 1953 production. This compares with 23 percent last January and a 10-year average of 18 percent.
