A REVIEW ON MARKETING WESTERN
AND CENTRAL NEW YORK CARROTS
SEASON 1934-35

Market reports on carrots were issued from the Rochester office from September 4th. until May 26th, 1935.

The production of 2,909,000 bushels in the late group of States, (Colo., Ill., Ind., Mich., Minn., New York, Ohio, Ore., Pa. and Wash.) was about 12 percent larger than the 2,482,000 bushels harvested in 1933. For the entire United States including the Fall, Early, Second Early, Intermediate and Late States the total production was estimated to be 13,005,000 bushels as compared with 10,635,000 during 1933.

New York continues to be the most important State growing late carrots and this year produced 1,102,000 bushels as compared with 767,000 bushels in 1933 and 927,000 bushels in 1932. The acreage within the State was estimated to be 1,900 as compared with 1,650 acres planted in 1933. Due to better growing conditions the latter part of the season, the yield per acre this year was much larger than a year ago, 580 bushels as compared with 465 during 1933.

F.o.b. prices this season were slightly lower than during 1933-34. The season started in September when 100-lb. sacks of topped, unwashed stock sold on wire orders from 65-85 cents, dropping to 45-65 in November, advancing slowly during January February and March to 55-80 cents. After that time prices advanced sharply and reached as high as \$2.25 during the first part of May.

Carrots in western and central New York are grown mostly on muck soil, although a considerable amount is produced on up-land soil. Wayne County continues to be the most important in production and this year more than half of the rail movement originated in that county. Other counties such as Genesee, Orleans, Monroe and Oswego are of considerable importance.

Below will be found the destinations of 1,548 of the cars moving by rail from the State this season. During the season one or more cars were billed into 20 states the District of Columbia and Canada as compared with 13 states, and the District of Columbia during the 1933-34 season.
