Daily market reports on onions were issued from the Rochester office from September 9, 1940, through May 24, 1941. These reports were mailed free-of-charge to all who requested them.

UNITED STATES

The 1940 production for the country was estimated by the Agricultural Marketing Service to be 15,397,000 sacks of 100 lbs. each as compared with 17,840,000 in 1939. The 10-year average (1929-38) was 14,157,000 sacks. In the Late States, the estimated production was 12,285,000 sacks of 100 lbs. each, which compares with 13,964,000 in 1939 and 10,290,000 sacks for the 10-year period. Figured in percentages, the Late 1940 crop was 12% less than in 1939, but 18% above the 10-year average. Harvested acreage for the Late States was estimated to be 55,090 acres, which compares with the 1939 plantings of 58,750 acres, while the 10-year average was 53,410 acres. The average yield per acre was estimated to be 223 sacks as compared with 238 the previous season and with the 10-year average of 193 sacks. Carlot shipments of the Late crop onions through May 17, 1941, amounted to 16,053 cars, while during the 1939-40 season to the same date 19,387 cars had moved. The crop in the late eastern and central group of states was about average, while the western group showed a marked reduction over the 1939 harvest.

NEW YORK STATE

The acreage planted to onions in New York State this season was estimated to be 15,500 acres as compared with 14,880 during 1939, while the 10-year average (1929-38) was 10,100 acres. The yield per acre this season was slightly under that of 1939, namely 265 sacks of 100 lbs. each per acre in 1940 as compared with 275 during 1939. The 10-year average for the State was 233 sacks per acre. The production during 1940 was larger than in 1939 and also above the 10-year average. This season the State produced 4,108,000 sacks of 100 lbs. each as compared with 4,092,000 in 1939, while the 10-year average for the State was estimated to be 2,327,000.

Due to the unfavorable spring weather, many growers were late in planting during 1940 and many fields of set onions were planted after May 15. Cool, rainy weather during the early part of the growing season prevented many growers from cultivating, consequently weeds were

numerous. During the later part of the growing season, conditions improved considerably which resulted in a fairly good crop being harvested.

F.o.b. prices of 50 lb. sacks of Yellows graded U.S.No.1 ranged from 55-82½¢ starting in September through the month of February. Prices advanced during the later part of March reaching as high as \$1.75. During the months of April and May, prices fluctuated considerably ranging from \$1.15-2.35. This advance in the later part of the season was caused partly by the excessive spring rains in Texas which did considerable damage to that crop of onions. Prices paid growers by dealers for U.S.No.1 Yellow Globes, bulk per hundredweight, held within the range of 80¢-\$1.30 through February. After that time, a sharp advance was noted and prices were erratic during the remainder of the season ranging from 90¢-\$4.00.

During the first part of March the Surplus Marketing Administration announced that they would consider the purchase of 300 cars of Yellow onions during the period March 20-April 10 and offered 50¢ per 100 lb. sack for U.S.No.1, 40 percent or more two inches and larger. Just about the time this offer was made, marketing conditions improved and growers did not sell any onions to the Surplus Marketing Administration.

The rail shipments from New York State through May 17 were 4,343 cars which compares with 3,669 cars rolled during the same period the previous season. While no check was made of the truck movement, it is the consensus of opinion among shippers that the use of truck continues to increase yearly.
