MARKETING WESTERN NEW YORK TOMATOES (GREEN)
(SUMMARY OF THE 1962 SEASON)

Daily Market Reports on green tomatoes were issued from the Rochester Office of the Federal-State Market News Service, 900 Jefferson Road, Rochester 23, New York from September 5 through September 28, 1962. As in the past, the office was maintained by the Fruit & Vegetable Division of the Agricultural Marketing Service, United States Department of Agriculture, cooperating with the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets, Division of Marketing.

The information contained in this Summary was obtained principally from these Daily Market Reports and from releases from the U.S. and New York State Departments of Agriculture and information from growers and shippers.

We would also like to thank both growers and shippers for the friendship, cooperation, and consideration that was extended to us this season.

UNITED STATES

The acreage planted for fresh market during 1962 was estimated 164,030 acres as compared with 172,090 acres in 1961. The harvested acreage during 1962 was estimated at 158,930 as compared with 165,880 during 1961. Yields per acre were practically the same for both seasons 128 hundredweight. Total production for the fresh market during 1962 was estimated at 20,401 thousand hundredweight as compared with 21,157 thousand hundredweight during 1961. The ten year average 1951-60 was estimated at 19,334 thousand hundredweight.

The acreage planted to tomatoes for processing during 1962 was estimated at 318,300 as compared with 306,850 acres during 1961 while the ten year 1951-60 average acreage was 333,350 acres. The harvested acreage in 1962 was estimated 316,150 as compared with 303,950 in 1961 while the ten year 1951-60 average was 326,920 acres. Production of tomatoes for processing during the 1962 season was estimated at 5,318,200 tons, slightly higher than the 4,247,700 tons in 1961. The ten year average for the country was 3,686,610 tons.

The new high in total output of vegetables for freezing and canning this season was primarily the result of the largest tomato crop ever produced. Tonnage in 1962 was 25 percent more than in 1961 and tomatoes accounted for 57 percent of the total 1962 tonnage of all processing vegetables.

NEW YORK STATE

The acreage planted to tomatoes for fresh market in New York State this season was estimated at 4,900 as compared with 5,200 in 1961 while the ten year average for the State was 7,090 acres. The harvested acreage this season was 4,700 as compared with 4,800 last year and the ten year average 1951-60 was 6,710 acres.

The acreage for tomatoes for processing in New York State this season was slightly lower than a year ago. This season 8,600 acres were planted as compared with 9,200 in 1961 while the ten year average for the State was 14,670. Harvested acreage this season in the State was 8,400 as compared with 9,100 in 1961 while the ten year 1951-60 average for the State was 14,090 acres. This season the yield per acre was slightly larger than a year ago, 13.7 tons as compared with 13.3 tons in 1961, while the ten year 1951-60 average yield per acre was 9.6. With a slightly larger yield per acre and somewhat less acreage, the production for the State for 1962 was estimated as 115,100 tons as compared with 121,000 tons in 1961, while the ten year average was 135,560 tons.

Harvesting for processing started about a week or ten days earlier than last year. During the planting and growing season, spotty weather prevailed in some sections but did not seriously affect the tomato crop. However, around mid-September, good growing conditions prevailed and growers harvested quite actively which taxed the capacity of some of the canners. Harvesting was completed about the first week in October.

F.o.b. prices this season were considerably lower than during the 1961 season. 40 lb. cartons, US#1, green, waxed, 6 x 6 and larger, ranged from \$1.95 to \$2.35 as compared with \$3.00 to \$4.00 during the 1961 season. US#1 stock, 6 x 7 and larger, ranged from \$1.50 to \$2.00 this season as compared with \$2.00 to \$3.50 last season.

PROCESSING

As usual, most of the crop was contracted for by processors at prices ranging from \$36.50 to \$47.50 for US#1s and \$24.50 to \$25.50 for US#2s. In some cases, an additional allowance of \$1.00 per ton was allowed for delivery charges.
