MARKETING SOUTHEASTERN SECTION (Florida, Georgia, Mississippi) PECANS

PRODUCTION: According to the United States Department of Agriculture Crop Reporting Service, the 1984 United States pecan crop totaled 232.4 million pounds. This represents a decrease of 14 percent when compared to the 1983 crop of 270.0 million pounds, but 6 percent more than the 1982 crop. Improved varieties accounted for 73 percent of the total crop in 1984, compared with 62 percent of the total in 1983. The average price received by pecan producers for the 1984 crop was 62.3 cents per pound, up 3.6 cents per pound from the 1983 crop. Despite the higher prices, the overall value of the 1984 crop fell 9 percent to 145 million dollars because of lower production.

Georgia's 1984 pecan production amounted to 120 million pounds, 52 percent of the 1984 national output. The 1984 crop was up 20 million pounds, from the year earlier crop and 5 million pounds below the 1982 crop. The 1984 crop tied the 1981 crop as the fourth largest crop on record. The 1984 production was surpassed by the 1963 crop of 124 million pounds, the 1982 crop of 125 million pounds, and the 1978 record high crop of 135 million pounds. The average price received by growers for Georgia's 1984 pecans averaged 55.3 cents per pound, down 7.6 cents per pound from 1983, and the lowest average price since 1975. Value of the crop totaled 66.4 million dollars, up 6 percent from 1983.

Mississippi production in 1984 was 5.5 million pounds, 2.5 million pounds less than the 1983 crop of 8 million pounds. Production for the 1982 crop was 4 million pounds. The average price received by producers in 1984 was 64.6 cents per pound. The overall value of the 1984 crop totaled 3.55 million dollars.

Florida pecan production in 1984 was set at 5 million pounds. This compares to 3.4 million pounds in 1983 and 4.5 million pounds in 1982. The average price received by producers in 1984 was 54.0 cents per pound. The overall value of the 1984 crop totaled 2.7 million dollars.

GROWING CONDITIONS AND HARVEST: Overall growing conditions for the southeastern crop was generally considered unfavorable. The more important months of the growing season consisted of extreme weather fluctuations. Heavy rainfall in July caused many trees to drop nuts early. The month of September, the most critical month for nut size development, was very hot and dry. There were problems in filling out of nuts in most cases due to this hot and dry weather which prevailed into early November. Meat yields were as a result frequently fair to poor. Light yields and fair quality nuts were prevalent. Offerings of high quality, high meat yielding nuts brought substantial premiums at points throughout much of the season.

Very light harvesting got underway in Florida and South Georgia during the first week of October, nearly a month earlier than the late crop of last year. First offerings in Mississippi were also available from the extreme southern portion of the state. Harvesting in the Delta District began by late October. The lack of rainfall for the entire month caused the harvest to progress slower than anticipated. Harvesting reached active levels by early November when the maturity of the crop improved. Harvesting remained at an active pace throughout the month. By the end of the month the Crop Reporting Service estimated a completion rate of 71 percent in Georgia and 66 percent in Mississippi. Harvesting was complete in most all areas except for the northern portions of the Georgia production area and the central and northern areas of the Delta District. A significant warming trend under clear skies in mid December allowed Georgia producers to actively harvest the tailend of the crop in the northern portions of the district and scrapping over in the southern portions. The tailend of the harvest in Mississippi at the Delta District did not fare as well due to heavy rainfall. Harvesting was complete by early February.

MARKETING: The first price report on pecans was issued on October 16. A wide range in quality of the crop caused dealers and shellers to purchase their supplies on a tier pricing system. Prices paid to growers on this pricing system was based on meat yield along with its percentage of useable meat, meat color, and meat appearance. Producers received what amounted to a premium for the larger size nuts, mostly on the improved varieties. Opening prices on large lots of more than 5,000 pounds were 90-95 cents for good quality stuarts and 40-45 cents for seedlings. Early demand was strong with most of the supplies going to gift pack operators and the fund raising trade. The early high prices is a typical pattern as these users are in high competition as supplies are needed as early as possible to cover orders for the holiday season. Prices remained near their opening levels until early November. Prices weakened then due to the seasonal increase of supplies. Along with the seasonal increase of supplies it became evident that the crop (especially stuarts) was displaying a wide range in quality. The tier system became widely used at this time. Prices recorded on December 6 were the seasonal low of the year. During this period stuarts were 75-80 cents for lots of good quality and 40-45 cents for fair quality lots. Seedlings brought 40-50 cents on large lots. Prices rallied slightly upwards soon afterwards. Supplies of good and fair quality stuarts were exhausted by late December. A light supply of seedlings continued to be marketed into late January. The final price report was issued on January 29 with seedlings ranging from 50-55 cents for large lots.

MARKETING LOUISIANA PECANS

PRODUCTION: According to the Louisiana Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, the 1984 Louisiana pecan crop totaled 5.0 million pounds. This was a substantial decrease compared against the 1983 crop when production was at 22.0 million pounds. In 1982 production was set at 10.0 million pounds. The 1984 production was the lowest total since 1976 when production only reached 2.0 million pounds. In 1984 native pecans comprised approximately 70 percent of the total crop, down slightly when compared to the 1982 total of 75 percent. Pecans are generally considered as an alternate bearing crop. On the average only about 15 percent of the Louisiana pecan crop comes from improved varieties and the remainder from native trees. The main improved varieties are Stuart, Desirable, Candy, and Schley. The average price received by producers for Louisiana's 1984 crop was 54.0 cents per pound, 11.5 cents more than the 1983 average price of 42.5 cents. The overall value of the 1984 crop totaled 2.7 million dollars, down sharply from the previous year total of 9.3 million dollars.

GROWING CONDITIONS AND HARVEST: Growing conditions were much the same experienced in other southeastern states where extreme weather fluctuations were common. There were problems in filling out of the nuts in many cases due to hot and dry weather. Meat yields as a result were frequently fair to poor. Light yields and fair quality nuts were prevalent.

Very light harvesting began in the southern portion of the state in mid October. Rainfall was heavy for the remainder of the month with the Crop Reporting Service estimating 8 percent of the crop being harvested by month's end. Active harvesting of the very light crop got underway by early November and continued at that pace for most of the month. By the end of the month the Crop Reporting Service estimated a completion rate of 65 percent. Inclement weather in early December delayed the tail end of the harvest as rain, snow, and freezing rain blanketed various portions of the state. The final stages of the harvest was completed by mid January.

MARKETING: The first price report on pecans was issued on November 1. Due to the very short crop prices were collected only briefly. Some firms located in the southern portion of the production district did not operate this season due to the low production. In addition, most of the large shelling firms purchased their supplies in neighboring southeastern states. Opening prices paid to growers for natives on small lots less than 1,000 pounds were mostly 40 cents. Prices varied from 35 to 40 cents for the remainder of the month.

MARKETING TEXAS PECANS

PRODUCTION: The 1984 Texas pecan crop was estimated at 25 million pounds by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This was approximately 64 percent less than the 1983 crop but 47 percent more than the crop of 1982.

GROWING CONDITIONS: Some trees were damaged by severe cold temperatures that were evident during late 1983 and early 1984. Young trees and nursery stock were the most seriously affected. Bud break started in Southern and Central areas of the state in mid-March and by mid-April most trees had leafed out. Droppage due to drought conditions severely reduced crop prospects in many areas with irrigated orchards, however, generally having a good set. Spraying was heavy in many areas for insects and disease.

HARVEST: Shucksplit began in South Texas on early varieties in late September with harvest starting in early October. Due to hot and dry conditions harvesting progressed rapidly through the state and began in the High Plains by early November. Rain in October and December caused harvesting delays but most gathering had been completed by early January.

QUALITY: In the Eastern half of the state quality was poor due to drought stress, insect and disease infestations. Pecan quality in the Trans Pecos and High Plains sections of West Texas was fairly good. Predator damage was also heavy in many areas as they completed for the limited supplies of pecans.

MARKETING: The first Texas Pecan Market News Report was released on October 23, 1984 with the last report being released January 10, 1985. Prices that were paid to growers for natives or seedlings ranged from 30 cents to 50 cents a pound in lots of less than 1,000 pounds. Improved varieties ranged in price from 55 cents to 1.00 a pound in lots less than 1,000 pounds. The value of the 1984 crop was estimated at \$22,130,000 dollars.

VARIETIES: The 1984 crop was comprised of 20 percent native or seedlings with improved varieties accounting for the remaining 80 percent. This compared with 68.6 percent native and 31.4 percent improved in 1983.

MARKETING OKLAHOMA PECANS

PRODUCTION-HARVEST: The 1984 Oklahoma pecan crop was estimated at 25 million pounds by the Oklahoma Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Native production was estimated at 23 million pounds and improved varieties were estimated at 2 million pounds. Many producers and accumulators disagreed with this estimate saying that it was too high. This crop follows last year's production of 8 million pounds and the 1982 production which was estimated at only 5 million pounds.

MARKETING: Prices for native pecans in lots of less than 1,000 pounds began the season at 35-40 cents per pound. Lots in excess of 1,000 pounds were only slightly higher at 40-42 cents. Good quality and demand kept prices moving higher through the first two months of harvest as they finally peaked at 50-55 cents for lots of less than 1,000 pounds and 55-60 cents for those in excess of 1,000 pounds. Most improved varieties were sold direct to consumers as were many native offerings. Direct marketing and accumulators moving supplies into cold storage kept up a good demand throughout the harvest. However, the single most important factor that supported the 1984 pecan prices was the generally good quality of pecans.

QUALITY: The 1984 Oklahoma pecan crop was of predominantly good quality and condition. Most nuts were adequately filled out and of good color. Pecan weevil damage was exceptionally light this year and this contributed substantially to overall quality.

MARKETING NEW MEXICO PECANS

PRODUCTION-HARVEST: The 1984 New Mexico pecan crop was estimated at 24 million pounds, down 17 percent from the 29 million pounds harvested the preceding season. Heavy rain and snow accumulations from mid-December through January delayed harvest significantly. The unusually wet conditions extended harvest well into February, about a month longer than normal.

MARKETING: The majority of New Mexico's pecans are sold by growers-shellers or through pooling arrangements with very few buyers dealing directly with the grower. The New Mexico Crop and Livestock Reporting Service estimated the average price received by growers at 83 cents per pound, 10 cents above the 1983 crop price.

Pecan acreage continues to expand in the state but at a much slower rate than the 1970's. New Mexico pecans are improved varieties produced under irrigation.

MARKETING NORTH CAROLINA PECANS

PRODUCTION: Growers experienced adverse weather conditions and disease problems this year, but still managed to increase their crop over an extremely low production in 1983. Problems ranged from black spot, worms, extremes in temperatures, to hurricane Dianna.

MARKETING: Prices were about steady with the 1983 crop. North Carolina production was about 2.9 million pounds, compared to 1.6 million in 1983. Improved varieties accounted for about 63 percent of this year's crop, with natives and seedlings making up 37 percent of the crop. This was a big turn around from the 1983 crop; improved varieties made up only 31 percent of the crop and 69 percent for natives and seedlings.
